Programme Objectives:

The Department of History under the School of Social Sciences has designed its course keeping in mind the diverse patterns of the past, focussing on the various possible ways of engaging with them. The courses illuminate different methodological approaches as well as key variables in understanding the past. Focussing on various genres of history—political, economic, social, cultural, intellectual—the syllabus seeks to provide students with a holistic understanding of the previous eras. Special emphasis is given on various issues of ‘local’ or ‘regional’ history, keeping in mind the setting of the university and the background of the students who come here to study. The syllabus also puts emphasis on the way ‘history’ as a discipline has evolved over the years, how the practice of ‘writing’ history has changed and how historians have negotiated with various theoretical formulations that have informed neighbouring disciplines. The courses also provide the students with tools to interpret not only the past, but the contemporary socio-economic and political configurations as well. History, as has often been pointed out, is a constant dialogue between the past and the present. The post-graduate course offers to make the students aware of the tremendous complexities of past issues while at the same time helping them to understand and analyse the contemporary world.

Programme Specific Objectives:

The courses offered under the programme aim at training students in the discipline of history. The courses will let them explore ways and means of encountering the past. The aim is to help them critically analyse how social and political structures are created and how these structures keep their legacies alive. While keeping the chronological order of things in mind, the courses are designed not to narrate events but rather to understand structural formations through time.

Programme Outcome:

The courses equip students to analyse the ways in which events unfold. They are therefore enabled not only to become teachers and social science researchers but also political and social analysts. Students of this programme might be interested in the administrative services as well

various non-governmental organizations and grass-root social service groups. They might also look for employment in the booming industries of the print and audio-visual media.

Evaluation:

Each course is evaluated on **50 marks** divided in the following manner:-

Internal Assessment – 10 marks.

End-semester Examination – 40 marks.

Ancient Indian Civilization: Culture, Society and Governance

Objectives:

This course aims to introduce students to the cultural, philosophical, social, religious, artistic, and political foundations of ancient Indian civilization. It seeks to develop an understanding of major philosophical traditions, social institutions, art and architecture, systems of governance, and administrative practices, while encouraging critical analysis of historical sources and historiographical debates on the evolution of ancient Indian society and state.

Outcome:

After completing this course, students will be able to explain the major philosophical and religious traditions of ancient India, analyze social structures and artistic developments, evaluate political theories and administrative institutions, and interpret historical sources critically. They will develop a comprehensive understanding of the cultural heritage, governance, and socio-political evolution of ancient Indian civilization.

Evaluation:

For this paper, there will be an Internal Assessment of 10 marks. The end-semester Examination will be on 40 marks divided in the following manner:- Question no. 1: Any two questions, 15 marks each, are to be answered out of four. (15x2=30) Question no. 2: Any two questions, 5 marks each, are to be answered out of four. (5x2=10)

Medieval India: State, Society, Polity, Religion and Philosophy

Objectives:

The paper Major Course-2 holds before its readers the varied aspects of Medieval Indian History with reference to their evolutionary gradual changes. The main objects of the course are to indicate the summum bonum which the society experienced through the ages.

Outcome:

The total outcome of going through the course is to get a vivid idea of what the Medieval Indian History was and how it was gradually changing holding out age-wise different pictures. Moreover it will awaken in the readers a clear idea of process-wise gradual impressive changes.

Evaluation:

For this paper (Total Credit-4), there will be an Internal Assessment of **10 marks**.

The end-semester Examination will be on **40 marks** divided in the following manner:-

Question no. 1: Any **two** questions, **15 marks** each, are to be answered out of **four**. (15x2=30)

Question no. 2: Any **two** questions, **5 marks** each, are to be answered out of **four**. (5x2=10)

Unit-1: Formation of the state in medieval India- a. evolution and problems, the political theory of the Sultanate b. The Mughal ruling class, organization of the nobility, the nobles and politics, jagirdars and Mansabdars, the military elites, their social and political backgrounds, cultures of political service, aristocratic aspirations and new identities.

Unit-2: The Structure of the Mughal agrarian society- a. village community, theory and practice- the pattern of land ownership and social stratification- the peasantry; b. Forests, people and state: continuities and changes c. class relations and class conflicts-- agrarian revolt; lower caste movements, the Jats etc.

Unit-3: Evolution of regional patterns: a. Bengal- the consolidation of Mughal authority, Local chieftains and *Baro-Bhuiyan* clans- powerful regional monarchy and their contributions; Emergence of *Bhum* principalities-Mallabhum Dynasty- political and socio-cultural novelty and the process of sanskritization. b. Koch Kingdom- Ahom-Koch conflicts for territorial dominance, religious and cultural impacts of Sankaradeva in the Koch court; c. Segmentary State- Vijaynagara –Bahmani conflict, Vijayanagara kingdom-political economy, society and culture. d. The Rajputs — From Resistance to Alliance (1556–1627) – Maharana Pratap, the Sisodias of Mewar, and the ideological significance of the Battle of Haldighati (1576), Matrimonial Alliances: The political and cultural impact of Rajput princesses in the Mughal harem and the stabilization of Rajput-Mughal relations. e. The geo-political vacuum in the Deccan- the rise of the Marathas, early territorial conquests, Shivaji and the concept of *Swarajya* (self-rule).

Unit-4: State – Religion, Philosophy and culture- a. Religion and Mughal political culture, mystical and intellectual currents, inter-faith dialogues, *sulh-i-kul*, b. philosophical movements- the Sufi and the Bhakti movements, c. trends in the evolution of the Bhakti movement in Bengal –regional Bengali culture, traditions of the Bhakti movement and the Goswami system, emergence of syncretic faith.

Transition to Colonialism in India: 1700-1857

Objectives:

The course charts the diverse developments that occurred during the advent of colonial rule in Indian subcontinent. It analyses key debates regarding the transformation in the polity and economy of the time and seeks to familiarise the students with the variety of ways historians have interpreted the events of this crucial period of Indian history.

Outcome:

The students will have an understanding of how key concepts of colonial Indian society, polity and economy were shaped during the first century of colonialism in India. They will make an appraisal of a period of conflict between two very different modes of governance, and people reacted to an alien system.

Evaluation:

For this paper, there will be an Internal Assessment of **10 marks**.

The end-semester Examination will be on **40 marks** divided in the following manner:-

Question no. 1: Any **two** questions, **15 marks** each, are to be answered out of **four**.

(15x2=30)

Question no. 2: Any **two** questions, **5 marks** each, are to be answered out of **four**.

(5x2=10)

Unit-2: Rise of the regional polities – Punjab, Awadh, Marathas and Bengal: a. Rise of Sikhism and its philosophy- Maharaja Ranjit Singh and the Anglo-Sikh wars b. Political foundations and governance in Awadh c. Anglo-Maratha relations d. emergence of Bengal as a centre of power under the Nawabs.

Unit-3: Coming of the European Companies: a. Dutch, French, Portuguese, English, Danish. b. English East India Company in Bengal: The Battle of Plassey and its aftermath.

Unit-4: The Company rule and resistance to it: a. Ideologies of the Raj, ideas of 'improvement', law, and property b. administrative changes under the Company rule – apparatus of rule— army, bureaucracy and the police c. Faqir and Sannyasi revolts, Chuar uprisings, Revolt of 1857.

Nationalism and the Struggle for Independence in India: 1858-1947

Objectives:

This course looks at the ways in which nationalism progressed in the 19th century. It charts the responses to colonialism. This course follows from an earlier course (102C) which traces the transition to colonialism from the 18th century.

Outcome:

This course will enable students to understand how responses to colonialism shaped the political nation. The course progresses chronologically to help students analyse the varied meanings of nationalism through decades.

Evaluation:

For this paper, there will be an Internal Assessment of 10 marks. The end-semester Examination will be on 40 marks divided in the following manner:- Question no. 1: Any two questions, 15 marks each, are to be answered out of four. (15x2=30) Question no. 2: Any two questions, 5 marks each, are to be answered out of four. (5x2=10)

Moreover, the notion of economic growth and its global perspective will be developed among the students.

History of Science, Technology and Medicine in India

Objectives:

This Course introduces students to the development and evolution of scientific practices in India from the ancient period to the twentieth century. It explores the diverse and rich history of Indian science and technology. Students will understand the mathematical, scientific and philosophical knowledge and tradition of ancient and medieval India. The course aims to examine developments in mathematics, astronomy, medicine, metallurgy, engineering, agriculture, architecture, and craft traditions, while fostering an understanding of their historical context, sources, and contributions to Indian and world civilization. Moreover, it seeks to engage students with the implications of the notion of colonial modernity and its connectedness with scientific practices.

Outcome:

Upon completion of the course, students will be able to explain the major scientific and technological achievements of Ancient India, critically analyse archaeological, literary, and epigraphic sources, assess the role of indigenous knowledge systems, and evaluate the impact of scientific innovations on society, economy, culture, and the development of civilizations from a historical perspective. Furthermore, it will help the students to understand the colonial notions of modernity and scientific practices could produce a structure of power and a distinct colonial governmentality on the one hand and could generate a nationalist response on the other.

Evaluation:

For this paper, there will be an Internal Assessment of **10 marks**.

The end-semester Examination will be on **40 marks** divided in the following manner: - Question no. 1:

This course will help students appreciate the nature of the colonial encounter. It will also help them understand why decolonisation studies remain incomplete, if restricted to specific dates. The course delineates the cultural project of colonialism.

Evaluation:

Indian Heritage : Art and Architecture

Objectives:

The course runs from the thirteenth to the middle of the eighteenth century in India, a period which witnessed not only dramatic political developments, but also changes in the realms of aesthetics. The course is designed to enable students to appreciate these changes and also continuities in art and architectural practices and see how developments in arts and aesthetics are not apolitical. The course introduces students to the ways in which there were breaking away from 'traditions' and also synthesis of older art forms with the new. The functional, everyday aspect of artistic creations also become a part of the course.

Outcome:

The course engages students with developments in cultural practices intricately associated with political developments in an important period of Indian history. The course helps students to appreciate the evolutionary and gradual changes in styles and techniques. The students learn how cultural practices are also linked with ideas of periodisation in history.

Evaluation:

For this paper, there will be an Internal Assessment of **10 marks**.

The end-semester Examination will be on **40 marks** divided in the following manner:-

Question no. 1: Any **two** questions, **15 marks** each, are to be answered out of **four**. (15x2=30)

Question no. 2: Any **two** questions, **5 marks** each, are to be answered out of **four**. (5x2=10)

- d) Religious architecture and sacred spaces: temples, stupas, monasteries, mosques, tombs and dargahs;
- e) Cultural interaction, patronage, artisans, craft traditions and the making of India's composite heritage

Unit 3: Architectural achievements of the Mughals:

- a) Assimilation of Indo-Islamic, Persian-Central Asian and Indian Hindu architecture; Various forts in Delhi, Agra Fort, Lahore Fort, Ajmer Fort and Allahabad Fort;
- b) Various Monuments at Fatehpur Sikri, Different types of arches, domes and vaults, Different types of ornamentations – murals, sculpting, Jali works, pietra-duraworks, Mughal gardens, Gate architecture;
- c) Regional styles – Deccan, Bengal, Kashmir, Lahore; Mughal painting styles- themes of Mughal paintings, Mughal painters; Later Mughal paintings-provincial Schools-Deccani styles.

Unit 4: Art and architecture of Bengal:

- a) Development of Shakta and Vaishnava Bhaktism –increasing popularity of Durga and Kali worship in Bengal.
- b) Bengal School of Painting; Nationalist themes-*Bharatmata*, Epic grandeur, political allegory and figures and rural and folk life- Abanindranath Tagore, Gaganendranath Tagore, Nandalal Bose, Jamini Roy, Ramkinkar Baij, Asit Kumar Halder and Sunayani Devi;
- c) Indigenous architecture in Bengal - innovation of Ratna and Chala style, Temples, Public and Domestic architecture;
- d) Manifestation of Indian art tradition and its regional variations-aesthetics of Bengali scroll painting (Jamini Roy), the forms of Modern Indian sculpture(Ramkinkar Baij);
- e) Folk painting Traditions and regional styles-Madhubani paintings, Deccan styles paintings, Kalighat Pat paintings, Tribal Paintings- Chhou dance, gods and goddess etc.

Objectives:

This course aims to familiarize students with the political, economic, social, and cultural history of South West Bengal during the colonial period. It examines regional kingdoms, the expansion of British rule, popular resistance, nationalist movements, and colonial transformations, enabling students to understand the region's distinctive historical experiences through critical engagement with historical sources and regional historiography.

Outcome:

After completing this course, students will be able to explain the historical development of South West Bengal under colonial rule, analyze regional resistance and nationalist movements, assess the impact of colonial economic and social changes, and evaluate the significance of regional leaders and events. They will also develop the ability to interpret regional history using historical evidence and historiographical perspectives.

Evaluation:

For this paper, there will be an Internal Assessment of 10 marks. The end-semester Examination will be on 40 marks divided in the following manner:- Question no. 1: Any two questions, 15 marks each, are to be answered out of four. (15x2=30) Question no. 2: Any two questions, 5 marks each, are to be answered out of four. (5x2=10)
